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REFUGEE COUNCIL: THERE FOR REFUGEES SINCE 1951

Refugee Council was founded in response to the UN Refugee Convention.

The right to claim asylum is an international human right and we believe that all those who come to the UK seeking protection should be treated equally with others in society.

1950-1960



A Polish family recently arrived from an Italian camp.

We supported over 2,000 east and central European refugees following World War II.

We set up Agnew House, a residential home for older refugees. Many residents were Holocaust survivors.

This is a picture of Michael K, the first resident at Agnew House.



1970s



We supported 5,619 Vietnamese and South East Asian refugees fleeing the Vietnam war.

1980s

In just two months in 1989, more than 3,000 Kurds sought asylum in the UK. They faced a multitude of barriers such as admission policies, detention and removal.

We started to strengthen our now well-respected advocacy work to fight for the rights of all refugees in the UK.



1990s



In 1994 we set up the only national service working with unaccompanied refugee children in the UK. To this day, we remain the only national organisation working with unaccompanied refugee children. Each year we help over 3,000 refugee children.

2000s

In 2015 we campaigned in response to the Syria crisis. We asked the Government to welcome Syrian refugees to the UK and we won!

The Government announced the introduction of this life-changing programme to resettle 20,000 Syrian refugees by 2020.

Last year we transformed the lives of almost 9,000 refugees in the UK.

CHILDREN

Each year, we support over 3,000 unaccompanied refugee children. Children who have seen their homes destroyed, loved ones killed, been tortured or trafficked.

MELODY'S STORY

Sent from her home country of Nigeria to live with a 'family friend', Melody was treated as a slave. She was beaten and sexually abused by men who visited the house.


Thrown out for refusing to comply with her 'Aunt', Melody lived on the streets for nine months.

Melody was severely traumatised when we first met her. It took a great deal of time and patience for her to open up about the horrors she'd experienced.

We were able to help Melody continue her education, receive mental health counselling and meet other young refugees.

Thankfully, she now has a safe home to stay in, a new family to be there for her and is slowly piecing her life back together.

A gift in your Will can help us to be there for more refugees like Melody in the future.





THE DIFFERENT WAYS YOU CAN LEAVE A GIFT IN YOUR WILL

A SHARE OF YOUR ESTATE

Once you have taken care of your loved ones, you can leave the remainder of your estate, or a share of the remainder, to us. This is known as a **residuary gift**.

A GIFT OF MONEY

You can leave an amount of money to Refugee Council in your Will. This is called a **pecuniary gift**.

A SPECIFIC ITEM

You can leave a particular item, such as artwork, jewellery or a property when making a Will. This is known as a **specific gift**.

A GIFT WHEN A TRUST ENDS

You might want to set up a trust in your Will so that someone can enjoy the benefit of money or property during their lifetime. Afterwards, the remaining money or property would then come to us. This is called a **reversionary gift**.

We can never predict the wars or conflicts of the future, so a gift without restrictions will allow us to help refugees however we are needed most. Please consider leaving your gift without restrictions.

We are extremely grateful for any type of gift left in your Will. Please speak to a solicitor if you're not sure which type of gift is best for you.

WRITING YOUR WILL

Here are a few tips for writing your Will.

1 YOUR ASSETS

Think about the assets that you own, how much they are worth and whether you share anything with friends or family.

Also spend some time thinking about any debts as these will reduce your overall estate value.

Remember to think about where your important documents are stored so that you can pass this information on to the relevant people.

2 LEAVING YOUR GIFTS

Think about the gifts that you'd like to leave to your loved ones. Make sure you have their full names and addresses.

After that, you might like to consider leaving a gift to Refugee Council.



3 CHOOSING YOUR EXECUTORS

Executors are people named by you in your Will who will carry out the instructions left in the Will and organise your estate.

An executor can be a friend, family member or a professional such as a solicitor or even a bank.

One of the most important things is to choose somebody you trust to carry out your wishes. If you choose friends or family members as executors, it is sensible to discuss this with them to check that they're happy with this decision.

CHANGING YOUR WILL

Never write on your Will – that would invalidate it.

If you already have a Will, a minor addition such as a gift to Refugee Council can be made using a codicil. This is a separate document that is signed and witnessed. It must be kept with your Will but not attached to it.

Major changes may call for a new Will, which would be easier to arrange the second time around.

We recommend that you ask a solicitor to write a codicil for you so that it reflects your wishes accurately.

SUGGESTED WORDING FOR YOUR WILL

TO LEAVE A SHARE OF YOUR ESTATE (residuary gift)

"I give all (or a% share of) the residue of my estate to British Refugee Council, Gredley House, 1-11 Broadway, Stratford, E15 4BQ, registered charity number 1014576 to be used for its general charitable purposes."

TO LEAVE A GIFT OF MONEY (pecuniary gift)

"I give the sum of £ (words & figures) to British Refugee Council, Gredley House, 1-11 Broadway, Stratford, E15 4BQ, registered charity number 1014576 to be used for its general charitable purposes."

TO LEAVE A SPECIFIC ITEM (specific gift)

"I give my [Describe the specific gift you wish to leave eg. my jewellery] to British Refugee Council, Gredley House, 1-11 Broadway, Stratford, E15 4BQ, registered charity number 1014576 to be used for its general charitable purposes."

We recommend that you use a solicitor to help write your Will. This will make sure that your wishes are expressed as accurately as possible.

YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

HOW CAN I FIND A SOLICITOR?

If you'd like a solicitor to help you write your Will, you can visit the Law Society website at lawsociety.org.uk for a list of legal professionals in your area. We always recommend using a solicitor to write your Will.

CAN A GIFT TO CHARITY HELP REDUCE INHERITANCE TAX?

Yes. If you leave at least 10% of your estate to charities like Refugee Council in your Will, you'll qualify for the reduced rate of inheritance tax of 36%. Leaving a percentage can also bring your estate below the inheritance tax threshold.

DO I REALLY NEED A WILL?

If you die without leaving a Will, this is called dying 'intestate'. It could mean that your estate does not benefit the people or causes you might have intended. If there are no family members left to inherit, the entire estate passes to the Crown.

WHAT IF I CHANGE MY MIND?

We understand that your Will is very personal to you and you can change your mind about leaving a gift to Refugee Council at any time. If you've previously told us you are intending to leave us a gift, it would be very helpful to let us know if that changes.

DO I HAVE TO TELL YOU IF I DECIDE TO LEAVE A GIFT?

Your Will is your private document so you don't have to tell us, or anyone, about your decisions. However, if you are happy for us to know that you have left us a gift, we'd love to know. It can help us to plan for the future and to transform even more lives.
